(1 Cor. 3:6,7) Not resting in God's sovereign control over the other person. (Dan. 4:35; Prov. 16:4) Not being gentle and forbearing when they fail you. (2 Tim. 2:24,25) Not waiting on the Lord to change them. (Ps. 27:14) Not being content in all circumstances. (Phil. 4:11) Love is kind. Not extending yourself to be sensitive, considerate, warm, responsive. (Col. 3:12) Repaying evil for evil, instead of giving a blessing. (Rom. 12:21) Using words that do not build up and are destructive. (Eph. 4:29; Jas. 3:5-10) Love is not jealous. Envying and resenting their prosperity, gifts or advantages. (Ex. 20:17; Jas. 3:16) Not being content with your own situation so you are not free to bless them in circumstances that may be more advantageous than yours. (1 Tim. 6:6) Love does not brag and is not arrogant. Boasting or viewing yourself as superior to them. (Prov. 27:2; Gal. 6:3) Glorifying self rather than glorifying God by building them up. (1 Cor. 10:31; Eph.4:29) Love does not act unbecomingly. Being controlling, manipulating, demanding or intimidating. (Phil. 2:3,4) Being rude, aggressive, vulgar or sarcastic. (Eph. 4:29; Col. 3:8) Treating them in a disdainful, demeaning, judgmental, condemning way. (Matt. 7:1-5) Not being polite, gracious and well-mannered. (Matt. 7:12)

	Being selfish, self-centered, self-absorbed, self-protective. (Phil. 2:3; Jas. 3:16)
	Seeking self-gratification. (1 Pet. 1:13-15)
	Demanding that your desires, standards and expectations be met through them.
	Having sinful responses when they fail to meet your expectations.
	Giving, pleasing or serving with the expectation to receive something in return.
	Being sinfully dependent on others, instead of being dependent upon God and His resources for your emotional and spiritual welfare. (2 Pet. 1:3)
	Not asking, "What is my motivation?" when giving to or responding to them.
	Being motivated for selfish gain? (self-gratification; self-interest; self - protection)
	Not being motivated to manifest love for God and for them.
	Not motivated to serve their best interest.
Love is not provoked.	
	Being incited to anger by their sins and failures. (Prov. 15:1)
	Getting angry or becoming embittered toward God or them when your will is thwarted. (Prov. 19:3; Heb. 12:15)
	Not realizing God holds you responsible for biblical responses when they sin against you. (1 Pet. 2:19-23; Matt. 6:14,15)
	Not relying on the Holy Spirit to enable you to return blessing for insult. (1 Pet. 3:9)
Love does not take into account a wrong suffered.	
	Not always forgiving them. (Mark 11:25)
	Holding grudges or suppressing when they offend you. (Col. 3:12-14)
	Retaliating through withdrawal or deliberately hurting them. (Rom. 12:17)
Love does not rejoice in unrighteousness.	
	Enjoying what you perceive as them getting what they deserve. (Prov. 24:17,18)
	Finding pleasure and excitement in your own sinful pursuits and in viewing or hearing about their sinful pursuits. (Rom. 1:28-32; Rom 12:9-12)
	Not viewing sin and its effects as God views it, a matter that causes mourning andgrief. (Eph. 4:30; Prov 8:13; Jas. 4:9,10)

Love rejoices with the truth.	
Disobeying the commands of God because of fear or to avoid possible negative outcomes. Ps. 112:7,8a)	
Lying and deceiving. (Eph. 4:25)	
Not accepting full responsibility for and repenting of your own sin rather than lying about it, minimizing, rationalizing or denying it. (Prov. 28:13)	
Not being trustworthy because you lack integrity. (Prov. 10:9)	
Not being open and teachable when receiving admonishment; being defensive	
Love bears all things.	
Not persevering patiently through tribulation. (Jas. 1:12; Gal. 6:9)	
Not protecting them by harming them and by sinning against them. (1 Cor. 13:7a)	
Not trusting that the Lord will never give you more than you can handle throughHis power and grace. (1 Cor. 10:13)	
Love believes all things.	
Not choosing to believe them in a particular situation, when you disagree with their defense, until facts prove them guilty.	
Jumping to assumptions about their motivations rather than asking them and then not going the extra mile to choose to believe them unless facts prove him otherwise, not realizing you would desire the same consideration. (John 7:51; Matt. 7:12)	
Love hopes all things.	
Not entrusting them to God's sovereign plan for their lives – to work in His time and in His way. (Eph. 1:11; 1 Cor. 3:6,7)	
Not placing hope in the Lord to sustain you, even if your circumstances do not change. (Ps. 62:5-8)	
Not viewing afflictions from an eternal perspective, knowing God is working all things for your good and in accordance with His purpose. (Rom. 8:28,29)	
Love endures all things.	
Not resting in the promises that God will never leave nor forsake you (Deut. 31:6,8)	
Not realizing God, through His power and grace, will make you steadfast in love for those who are difficult. (1 Cor. 15:58; 2 Cor. 12:9,10)	
Not being willing to suffer for the sake of righteousness and to receive God's way of blessing you in the difficulty. (1 Pet. 3:14)
